
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Virtual Piano Lessons... Who Would Have Imagined?

Practice Makes Progress:Work Towards the Three C's

Curiosity: Are you, the performer, curious about the music in a way that allows you to continue to discover new layers?

Communication: Can you share all the contents of the music in a way that if another musician was given a blank copy of the score and had to fill in the articulations, dynamics, phrase markings, etc., it would align pretty closely to what the composer wrote in your copy of the score?

Conviction: Can you play in a way that leaves no doubt as to what you are communicating?


