What is it about piano/music that you love? The way my fingers and mind work together to learn an insane amount of notes in a small amount of time is insane to me!

Tell us about your practice routine - how do you stay organized in practicing? I practice 6 days a week for an hour - usually after school or in the evenings. I have to make sure that there is nothing around me that might make me want to get up or become unfocused, as practicing requires a lot of focus and determination. I try and keep all of my songs in a binder and have multiple items like pencils and highlighters ready to mark my music. Over the past year I have learned to take a lot of the tips that Ms. Elizabeth gives me in lessons and apply them to every new piece I play - there is a lot of overlap and this helps make the learning process more efficient. One of my favorite practicing tips is to play the music from various points starting at the end of the piece or to use rhythm exercises.

What is the hardest challenge you face in practicing? How do you overcome it? Memorization has always been one of the hardest parts of piano for me, so using the above techniques helps get a piece into my mind faster and more efficiently.

What is your favorite piece you have played so far (and why)? I have always wanted to learn Ludwig van Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata." Last year I decided that I was ready to take the time to learn it. Now, almost a year later, I have almost completed it and am very proud of how far I have come. I love how smooth and expressive the first movement is, but then how exciting and fast the last movement is. Once I complete this piece I am hoping to find many other pieces to play that can give me the same excitement and bring out more emotion in my playing.

What is your proudest accomplishment in playing piano? What are your goals for the future? I entered my first piano competition in 2017 and I ended up winning first place. Knowing that I really could play well started giving me a lot more confidence in my playing and made me want to keep playing, and improve my piano performance. In doing so I am hoping to minor in piano performance when I get to college, to keep playing piano and to always share music for others. Piano is one of the biggest parts of my life, I love music and it helps me be free and relax even when it takes so much work. I know that all the effort I have put in now will definitely benefit me in the future in helping me take on new pieces with confidence!

Piano Prodigies: The Journey to NCTM

The majority of my professional education focused on the skills related to music performance: the study of a wide range of classical and modern repertoire, theory, harmony, ear training, and history. I started lessons at four, participated in festivals, competitions, and masterclasses along the way, and was performing internationally by my teens. A turning point in my life was when I received a graduate teaching assistantship at the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University. This assistantship provided the opportunity to receive a graduate education at one of the world's best music programs in exchange for instructing group piano classes, teaching music minors, preparing music majors for the keyboard proficiency exam, and teaching advanced pianists taking music as an elective (note: among my first students: one who had recently received her master's degree in piano performance!).

After graduating from IU in December 2007, I started teaching full time at two pre-college programs: ARTIST Music and The Maryland Conservatory alongside some teaching at Morgan State University and Towson University. Much of my teaching was based on my own studies: the process I went through and the teachers who inspired me. I also absolutely credit my parents: both have had long careers in education and I have observed their teaching many times. They balance expertise in their fields with a passion for cultivating curiosity and excellence in their students.

In 2011, I founded Piano Prodigies in Baltimore, Maryland. I soon had a full studio and was excited was wonderful to see students grow up as young people and as musicians. In 2015, I was enjoying sending these students to local festivals and competitions in (after six years of studies, many were at the point of just starting to take on advanced repertoire) when I found out that I'd be moving to New Hampshire. Starting over would be a challenge, so it seemed that now would be the time to re-invest in my professional development.

The Music Teachers National Association is one of the oldest and most revered organizations for musicians in this country. I had attended state and national conferences and heard about the National Certified Teacher of Music distinction. I was eager to balance my performance degrees with something that would reflect my dedication to teaching.

Thus, I enrolled in the certification process and began two years of working towards this distinction. This included a fair amount of assignments: reading, writing, and submitting videos of my teaching. Finally, the time came to submit my portfolio.. Weeks later I received the good news: national certification achieved! (and, thereby becoming the only Nationally Certified Teacher of Music (any instrument) by MTNA in the Upper Valley).

And... just like students engage in a long-term commitment to learning, so do teachers. We can *always* expand and grow our skills! MTNA requires that I submit a portfolio annually (indicating my professional activities and continuing education) to receive a renewal of this certification. 2021 marks my fourth renewal, received this just a couple of weeks ago. Thank you for your support and inspiration!


